- Largely based on true stories


Herman Melville:

- August 1, 1819 September 28, 1891
- American novelist, teacher, poet, short story writer, lecturer and sailor
- Famous books: Typee, Omoo, Redburn, Mardi, White-Jacket and Moby-Dick

Summary:

In part, Moby-Dick is the story of an eerily compelling madman pursuing an unholy war against a creature as vast and dangerous and unknowable as the sea itself. But more than just a novel of adventure, more than and encyclopedia of whaling lore and legend, the book can be seen as part of its author's lifelong meditation on America.
